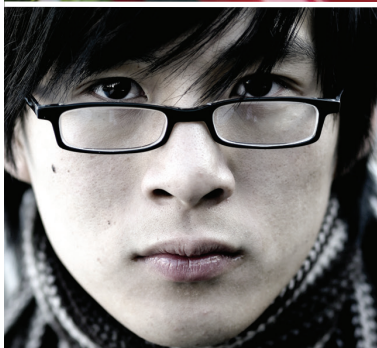

Sexual violence is a significant public health problem impacting nearly a million people in Wisconsin¹. It is perhaps the most personal and invasive expression of violence that one person (or a group) can perpetrate upon another individual. Victims of sexual assault come from every walk of life, and this epidemic knows no boundaries; sexual violence affects us all. But what is the real burden of sexual violence on the communities in Wisconsin?

Burden reports are designed to provide a snapshot of the impact a disease, injury or crime has on a community. These reports provide vital information to assist communities, policy-makers and providers in developing strategies and policies to reduce incidences of disease or injury. Although sexual violence has been defined as a significant public health issue, this type of report hasn't been commonly used to identify the burden as it relates to sexual assault. The inability to accurately articulate the burden of sexual violence has impacted service providers, responders and, most importantly, survivors. For responders and service providers, the lack of access to data has hindered their ability to advocate for funding for services. It also impacts outreach to communities and engagement of partners who all too often think that sexual violence isn't a problem. However, these challenges are most damaging when they impact survivors. The lack of resources means limited availability of sexual assault services. Furthermore, when communities do not understand sexual assault, there is a lack of support for survivors which may cause further isolation and trauma.

Sexual assault data only tells us part of the story. Due to the complex nature of sexual violence, data can be difficult to collect and even harder to analyze. A significant challenge is that sexual assault is the most under-reported violent crime.² Even though many different providers collect data – law enforcement, hospitals, and advocacy centers – they are only capturing the victims who report. According to a Bureau of Justice Statistic (BJS) average of the past five years, 65% of rapes/sexual assaults are never reported to law enforcement.³ Another significant challenge to sexual violence data collection is the wide range of definitions used which impact the consistency of reporting data. The main data sources utilized for this report all define sexual assault in a slightly different manner. This may be due to a difference between state law and terms used for national reports, or due to research philosophy. Despite these challenges, we believe there is inherent value in examining the burden of sexual violence using the most widely available sources of data.

The *Burden of Sexual Violence in Wisconsin* report compiles data from a variety of sources to help us articulate the impact sexual violence has at a state level, as well as in each of the 72 counties. This report seeks to heighten awareness and provide critical information to communities so they can successfully initiate and support efforts to prevent sexual violence. The following data is included in the report: prevalence; reports to advocacy, medical (state-level only) and law enforcement; and convictions. Prevalence

The prevalence data included in this report is based on the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (NISVS)⁴. The NISVS was released in 2011 and contains state-level data on sexual violence and outlines health consequences to survivors. The estimated rate from NISVS was utilized in conjunction with population data to look at the prevalence of sexual violence in Wisconsin. As discussed earlier, trying to capture the burden of sexual violence by examining the number of survivors who reported to “systems” is problematic due to the fact that sexual violence remains vastly under-reported. Prevalence data helps overcome the issue of under-reporting and provides a more accurate number of individuals who have experienced sexual violence at some point in their lives.

Advocacy

The data concerning reports to advocacy organizations represent the unduplicated number of sexual assault victims served by the agency in 2010. WCASA conducted a survey of advocacy organizations in 2012 and the results of that survey are the basis for the data contained in this report. We include this data because the role of the advocate is unique. The primary responsibility of an advocate is to provide services to survivors, regardless of whether that individual wishes to report to any other system, be it medical or criminal justice. Advocates offer confidential services so they represent a critical point of access for sexual assault victims. Advocacy organizations provide comprehensive services including:

crisis intervention and response, medical and criminal justice advocacy, support group and therapy, prevention, education and training.

Medical

The healthcare system represents another important access point and survivors have options related to their medical care, including having a forensic exam for the collection of evidence. The medical data included in this report comes from two primary sources: the Department of Health Services (DHS) and the Department of Justice (DOJ). The Hospital/Emergency Room Data (from DHS) represents the number of people who present to an emergency room where sexual assault was identified as the reason for admission. This data is limited due to the way medical records are coded, which varies between hospitals. The DOJ data represents the number of forensic exams paid for either by the Sexual Assault Forensic Exam (SAFE) Fund or Crime Victim Compensation (CVC). When combined, this data provides an indication of the number of sexual assault victims who sought a sexual assault forensic examination or medical treatment.

Law Enforcement

The law enforcement data included in this report comes from Sexual Assaults in Wisconsin 2010 published by the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance (OJA).⁵ This data represents the number of sexual assaults reported to Wisconsin

law enforcement agencies. These reports are part of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, which are reported to OJA on a monthly basis. Examining law enforcement data is critical as it provides an indication of the number of sexual assault victims who report their assault to the criminal justice system. Law enforcement acts as an entry point to the criminal justice system and this data serves as an important foundation for examining the criminal justice system response to sexual violence.

Convictions

The conviction data comes from the Department of Corrections (DOC). This data includes convictions under three statutes: Sexual Assault, Child Sexual Assault, and Engaging in Repeated Acts of Sexual Assault of the Same Child (Wis. Stats. [§ 940.225](#), [§ 948.02](#), and [§ 948.025](#)). Unlike law enforcement data, conviction data is the “tip of the iceberg” when it comes to examining the criminal justice response to sexual violence. They represent assaults in which a victim reported to law enforcement, where a prosecutor decided to charge the perpetrator, and in which the perpetrator was actually convicted of a crime. At each stage in the process, the discretion of key individuals can work to divert those cases away from the criminal justice system. While we did not have access to data regarding the number of sexual assaults referred for prosecution or charged in 2010, that data could be useful in the future as part of a more comprehensive examination of the criminal justice system response to sexual violence.

Demographics

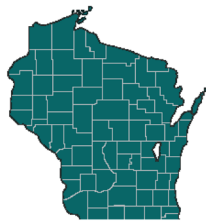
Finally, to provide some context in which to examine the data included in the report, we have included demographic information for both Wisconsin as a whole as well as all 72 counties. This data was collected from The American Community Survey (ACS) – the largest household survey in the United States – which collects detailed demographic, socioeconomic, and housing information. Our analysis is based on ACS estimates collected from 2005 through 2009.

Conclusion

We hope that *The Burden of Sexual Violence in Wisconsin* serves as a starting point for examining the impact of sexual violence on communities. Communities, policy-makers and service providers can determine what this data means for their work, as well as explore what other data sources are available to assess response and prevention efforts. Finally, and most importantly, while this report goes to great lengths to demonstrate the burden of sexual violence in Wisconsin, it does not attempt to articulate the true burden of this crime. That can only be defined by the thousands of brave survivors across Wisconsin living with this burden every day.

It is because of their courage that we have the opportunity to present this report.

The *Burden of Sexual Violence in Wisconsin* attempts to provide a full scope of the extent of sexual violence using a variety of sources.

The purpose of this report is not to place blame or assign responsibility, but rather to look at the overall problem of sexual violence to determine gaps and identify opportunities to improve a community's response to sexual violence. It can also be used to heighten awareness and provide critical information to plan and implement efforts to prevent sexual violence. While this report pays particular attention to the criminal justice system, we also know that an individual survivor's perception of justice cannot be linked solely to that system.

Assessing System Response to Sexual Violence

There are multi-disciplinary teams located across Wisconsin that assess both the community and criminal justice system response to sexual violence. Whether these are Coordinated Community Response (CCR) teams or Sexual Assault Response Teams (SART), there is an existing infra-structure in many communities across Wisconsin that examines sexual violence in their counties. This report can be used to identify strengths and challenges within these systems and target areas for improvement. Thus we envision the *Burden of Sexual Violence in Wisconsin* will be utilized by these multi-disciplinary teams in assessing how the community and criminal justice systems are responding to sexual violence.

Advocacy, Outreach, and Prevention

The *Burden of Sexual Violence in Wisconsin* provides an overview of the impact of sexual violence and the data contained herein may enable organizations to make the argument for an increased allocation of resources to better meet the need of survivors. Data provides something concrete that policy-makers should examine when making important funding decisions. As a result, this report can be utilized as a tool to seek out additional resources for sexual assault services.

Beyond advocating for increases in funding, this report can assist organizations in building allies and support in their communities. It can open the door for communities to dialogue about the difficult topic of sexual violence. And since sexual violence is all too often a hidden problem, the report provides programs working with sexual assault survivors the opportunity to outreach to new partners. Outreach also allows programs to increase their visibility in their communities, which may allow for an increased ability to interact with survivors who otherwise would not come forward.

With increased education and awareness of sexual violence, there comes the opportunity to not only improve systemic responses for sexual assault survivors, but also an increased ability to prevent sexual violence. Data may be one way of changing community norms about sexual violence and victims. This may lead to an increased ability to hold perpetrators accountable and also to challenge the norms and attitudes that allow sexual violence to be perpetrated.

It is important to understand some of the limitations of the data included in the *Burden of Sexual Violence in Wisconsin*. In terms of the estimates provided by NISVS, all of the limitations that apply to their data and methodology also apply to this report. A link to the full NISVS report can be found in the Reference section on page 25.

As mentioned previously, prevalence data seeks to estimate the number of individuals who have experienced sexual violence during their lifetime. In contrast, the other data included in the report is for the 2010 calendar year. Thus caution should be utilized when comparing the prevalence data with the other data. NISVS does include data on the 12 month prevalence; however, that data was only reported nationally and these estimates are not available at the state level. Similarly, NISVS includes lifetime prevalence for rape of men but does not provide that data for Wisconsin. The other missing piece to the NISVS data is county level estimates. Due to data limitations, estimates are not provided at a county level; therefore, state-level rates are shown on the county pages. It is not recommended by the authors of NISVS to apply rates from national or state levels to create county estimates.

We are also cognizant that the *Burden of Sexual Violence in Wisconsin* does not include data from all the systems/providers in which a sexual assault survivor may access services. Advocacy data was primarily collected from formally recognized SASPs, yet survivors may seek supportive services from a variety of formal

and informal networks within communities. With respect to medical care, it's important to note that even within the available data systems – from DHS and DOJ – there are gaps, including: victims who seek medical care from other sources (primary care providers or family planning centers) and forensic examinations that are not submitted to SAFE or CVC. With respect to the criminal justice system, the data only includes reports to law enforcement and convictions. A more complete picture of the criminal justice system might also examine the following data: arrests, referrals for prosecution and charging.

There are additional limitations to note when comparing the other data. The conviction data is broken down by offenses against children and adults; whereas the law enforcement and advocacy data may include both adult and child victims but doesn't include an age breakdown. Furthermore, one cannot simply total the advocacy, medical, law enforcement and conviction data to obtain the number of systematic contacts in 2010. An individual survivor may have reported to more than one system thus there is undoubtedly duplication in these data sources.

Finally, this report does not examine data specific to communities that are disproportionately impacted by sexual violence. No attempt has been made to separate out victims or service provision by racial or ethnic background, sexual orientation, physical or cognitive ability, economic class or gender identity. Yet research indicates that some communities experience sexual violence at higher rates. For example, sexist and racist attitudes make women of color particularly

vulnerable to sexual violence and can impede their access to supportive services.⁶ This creates individuals or groups who are under-served or un-served, which inevitably impacts data collection. It can be attributed to a variety of factors, including: bias in the community; lack of visibility; lack of training and understanding of systems; or physical/geographic isolation. Accounting for these inequities is a key part of accurately articulating the true burden of sexual violence and this limitation should be examined in future reports, as well as discussed when reviewing the data.

For this report we used data from a variety of sources. Please see each section below for a description of the data source and methodology used.

Prevalence Data

To describe the prevalence of sexual violence in an individual's lifetime we use the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (NISVS). This data is an ongoing, nationally representative random digit dial (RDD) telephone survey that collects information about experiences of sexual violence, stalking, and intimate partner violence among non-institutionalized English and/or Spanish-speaking women and men aged 18 or older in the United States. NISVS provides detailed information on the magnitude and characteristics of these forms of violence for the nation and for individual states. Complete interviews were obtained from 16,507 adults (9,086 women and 7,421 men).

The questionnaire includes behavior-specific questions that assess sexual violence (as well as stalking, and intimate partner violence) over the lifetime and during the 12 months prior to the interview. The survey is focused exclusively on violence and collects information about: Sexual violence by any perpetrator, including information related to rape, being made to penetrate someone else, sexual coercion, unwanted sexual contact, and non-contact unwanted sexual experiences. NISVS applied the lifetime prevalence rates of sexual violence and rape for men and women separately using demographic data to estimate the number of

individuals who have been victims. Since NISVS was conducted with participants over 18 years of age, the victimization rates were applied to the same population of females and males over 18. NISVS provided state-level estimates for Wisconsin, which are included on the state page, as well as on county pages.

Advocacy Data

Advocacy data was primarily collected from the 47 WCASA designated Sexual Assault Service Providers (SASP) across Wisconsin through Survey Monkey. In some counties, other providers – who are not designated SASPs – also provided data. Programs that provided data are listed on each county page. This data was compiled to provide the state total. Additionally, there are counties with no advocacy data. These counties will be indicated with “No data available”

Medical Data

The Hospital/Emergency Room Data represents the number of people seen in an emergency room where sexual assault was identified as a reason for admission. This module creates statistics on emergency department visits to Wisconsin hospitals for the treatment of relatively minor injuries. It includes only emergency department visits that resulted in the patient being released. It does not include emergency department visits that resulted in the patient being admitted as an inpatient in this or another acute-care hospital or another type of institution (or

dying in the emergency department). This data includes visits regardless of patient residence, and thus the data selections can include both residents and non-residents of Wisconsin. The DOJ data represents the number of forensic exams paid for either by the SAFE Fund or CVC.⁷

Law Enforcement Data

In order to provide information on the total number of sexual assaults by county, we use data from the OJA Statistical Analysis Center in Wisconsin. This data was originally provided from the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. The sexual assaults described from this data were reported to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies between January 1 and December 31, 2010. This report will focus on six sexual assault offense types defined by the Wisconsin UCR program. These offense types are: Forcible Rape, Forcible Sodomy, Assault with an Object, Forcible Fondling, Statutory Rape, and Ejaculate/Excrete upon Victim. Also, because of data limitations we were unable to distinguish between sexual assaults committed against children and adults.

Conviction Data

In order to detail trends in convictions of sexual assault we used data from DOC in 2010 for individuals convicted of sexual assault. The conviction data includes convictions for the following offenses: [§ 940.225](#), [§ 948.02](#), and [§ 948.025](#).

However the data reported from DOC includes only those convictions in which the offender was in the custody or supervision of DOC – i.e. sentenced to confinement in the Wisconsin state prisons or probation – and would not include offenders who received a sentence in the county jail without any term of probation. While this is likely most applicable to those convicted of 4th degree Sexual Assault under [§ 940.225 \(3\)\(m\)](#) – a misdemeanor – it is possible that small numbers of felony sexual assault convictions could be absent from the data due to the above reasoning.

Demographic Data

Finally, in order to describe the county demographics of Wisconsin, we used The American Community Survey (ACS) which collects detailed demographic, socioeconomic, and housing information. The ACS produces 3-year estimates annually for geographic areas with a population of 20,000 or more. In 2010, the Census Bureau released the first 5-year estimates for small areas. These 5-year estimates are based on ACS data collected from 2005 through 2009, which we use in this analysis.

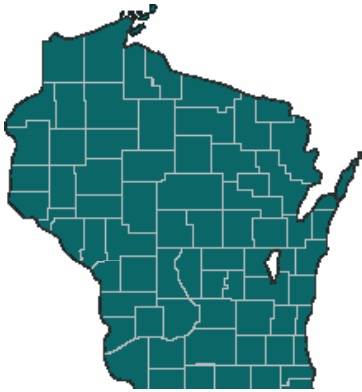
